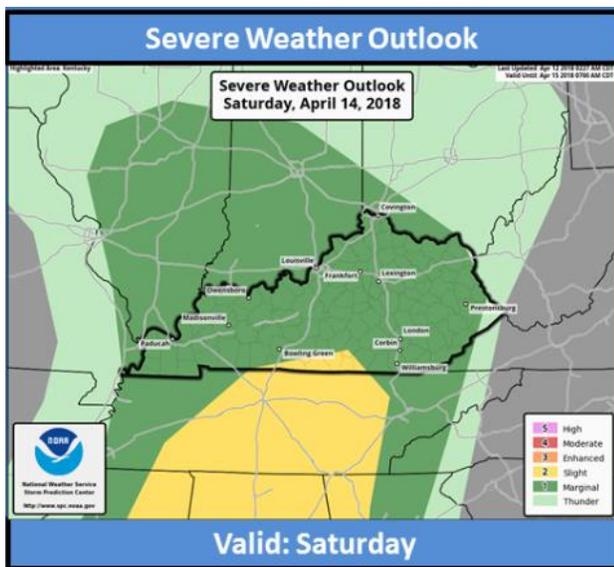
### Gov. Bevin Receives Notification of Presidential Disaster Declaration for Eastern Kentucky Counties Impacted by Flooding

(From a Press Release - Governor's Office) **FRANKFORT, Ky. (April 12, 2018)** – Governor Matt Bevin today received notification that President Donald Trump has authorized assistance for certain Kentucky counties that suffered significant damage as a result of the severe flooding event from Feb. 9 through Feb. 14.

The President's action grants public assistance to the 22 impacted counties to repair roads, bridges and other infrastructure. The declaration will also provide the Commonwealth with mitigation funds.

Counties included in this declaration include Bell, Breathitt, Clay, Estill, Floyd, Harlan, Johnson, Knott, Knox, Lawrence, Lee, Leslie, Letcher, Magoffin, Martin, Metcalfe, Owsley, Perry, Pike, Powell, Whitley and Wolfe.

**NWS Louisville:** Hazardous weather outlook is for portions of Central Kentucky. (Friday through Wednesday) Southwest winds will be sustained 10-20 mph with gusts 30-35 mph at times. Some locally higher gusts near 40 mph will be possible during the afternoon hours. Minimum relative humidity of 30-35 percent and dry conditions will result in an **elevated risk of fire weather concerns**, especially along and east of I-65.

Thunderstorms will be possible Saturday and Saturday night ahead of an approaching cold front. Some of these storms Saturday late afternoon and evening could be strong with gusty winds and heavy rainfall.

**NWS Jackson:** (Friday through Wednesday) Brisk winds and low relative humidity will result in an **elevated threat for wildfires** during the afternoon and early evening hours on Friday.

Thunderstorms are possible Saturday into Sunday morning. Frost and sub-freezing temperatures will be possible Tuesday morning.

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**Recalls Injectable Pain Relievers**

(AHA Today) Premier Pharmacy Labs has voluntarily recalled several lots of injectable drug products, primarily opioid pain relievers, due to possible microbial contamination, the Food and Drug Administration [announced](#) yesterday. Hospitals and other health care facilities should stop using and return any recalled products to the company as described in a certified letter sent to all affected customers. Any adverse reactions or quality problems experienced with the products may be reported to the FDA's [MedWatch](#) program.

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**Power Outage Due to Damaged Power Lines - Northern Puerto Rico**

(NICC-HSIN) 12 Apr 18 (Update 01): At 1340 EDT on 12 Apr, the Infrastructure Protection / Protective Security Advisor for Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands reported a major loss of power for northern Puerto Rico. As of 1710 EDT PSA reported the power line had been re-energized with only five percent of customers without power and the Luis Munoz Marin Airport has been fully restored.
