CDC releases *STRIVE* infection control training courses

(AHA Today) The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has released the first in a new series of *free* online training courses to help health care organizations prevent and control infections. Developed by the AHA's Health Research & Educational Trust, the first courses cover competency-based training, hand hygiene and strategies for preventing healthcare-associated infections. Eight more courses — on topics such as environmental cleaning, building a business case for infection prevention, and engaging patients and family members — will be added over the next few months. HRET, part of the AHA Center for Health Innovation, led a team of national infection prevention experts to develop the STRIVE curriculum with funding from the CDC.

KY ACEP Endorses Collective Medical's EDie Software

The Kentucky Chapter of the American College of Emergency Physicians (KACEP), the nation's largest emergency medical organization with more than 37,000 emergency physicians, endorses technology that enables emergency physicians to access, in real time, essential patient medical record information from different organizations across the community, called "Collective Medical". Collective Medical's emergency department information exchange (EDie) software is an ED-specific application that provides emergency physicians with instant access to a patient's history from other EDie-connected clinics, facilities, treatment centers and other emergency departments.

Doctors Can Reduce Opioid Prescriptions Without Patients Suffering

(NPR) When they started practicing medicine, most surgeons say, there was little or no information about just how many pain pills patients needed after specific procedures. As a result, patients often were sent home with the equivalent of handfuls of powerful and addictive medications. Then the opioid crisis hit, along with [studies](#) showing one possible side effect of surgery is long-term dependence on pain pills. These findings prompted some medical centers and groups of physicians to establish surgery-specific guidelines.

But questions remained: Would anyone pay attention to the guidelines and would smaller amounts be sufficient to control patients' pain? **Yes**, appears to be the answer to both — in some measure — according to a study that encompassed nearly 12,000 patients in 43 hospitals across Michigan. The researchers [published details](#) of their work in a letter Wednesday in the *New England Journal of Medicine*.

New York physician admits to manslaughter after patient dies of overdose

(Becker's Hospital Review) A New York City physician faces four to nine years in prison after pleading guilty Aug. 13 to second-degree manslaughter for writing prescriptions for a powerful narcotic that led to a patient's death from overdose, according to a [press release](#) from New York Attorney General Letitia James.

As part of his guilty plea, Barry S. Sloan, DO, admitted he issued two prescriptions for fentanyl to a 36-year-old patient in August 2014 without any medical justification. The patient filled the prescriptions four days after they were issued and died the next morning from a fentanyl overdose.

Overcrowding in hospital ERs leads to increased violence

Overcrowding of hospital emergency departments has become a major factor in safety problems or potential ones, according to a new Massachusetts government report. The report released Tuesday by the Betsy Lehman Center for Patient Safety, a state agency aiming to reduce patient harm, estimates between roughly half and four-fifths of what it calls adverse incidents in emergency departments are largely avoidable. That rate more than doubles other areas of a hospital, the report said, and many of those incidents stem from overcrowding. Nationally, more than 90% of emergency departments have reported routine overcrowding, the report said.

The Ryan White CARE Act Turns 29

August 18 will mark the 29th anniversary of the Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency (CARE) Act. First authorized in 1990, the Ryan White CARE Act is the legislation that created the HRSA HIV/AIDS Bureau (HRSA HAB) Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program. The Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program provides a comprehensive system of HIV primary medical care, medications, and essential support services for low-income people with HIV, and is a critical component of the "Ending the HIV Epidemic: A Plan for America" initiative, which was announced earlier this year during the State of the Union address. New Treatment for Deadliest Strain of Tuberculosis Is Massively Successful

(Newser) – Good news for those with the deadliest strain of tuberculosis: It no longer has to mean a death sentence. Scientists have discovered a cure for extensively drug-resistant TB, or XDR-TB, and on Wednesday, the FDA "effectively endorsed" it, the [New York Times](#) reports. The new regimen is easier, shorter, has less severe side effects, and the preliminary trial results show a 90% success rate against XDR. The three-drug regimen, known as [Nix-TB](#), includes two previously approved drugs (bedaquiline and linezolid) plus pretomanid, which the FDA on Wednesday approved for XDR-TB patients as long as it is used in conjunction with the other two.

Why ambulance bills are so high, and so unexpected

(WNYC/*The Takeaway*) There's been a lot of talk in Washington and among Democratic presidential candidates in the 2020 race about the high cost of medical care, from insurance to medication. But one of the biggest sources of surprisingly high bills is from ambulances, and so far they've been left out of the conversation. They look at why it costs so much to take an ambulance, how dispatching systems work, and why insurance often doesn't cover ambulance trips.

What is also interesting is the growing use of services like "Uber" and "Lyft" as an alternative to get to a hospital at much lower costs! The story says in one study that has grown to about 7% of cases studied already.

[CDC inspection at Fort Detrick's USAMRIID underscores need for regulations at other labs](#) (*The Fredrick News-Post*) It is not unusual for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to inspect a laboratory at Fort Detrick. Expected or unannounced inspections by the CDC are just part of the regulations the U.S. Army Medical Research Institute of Infectious Diseases adheres to so that it can study dangerous viruses, toxins and bacteria. The fact that the CDC found problems in its latest inspections of the facility illustrates why such regulations are needed, many have said.

**GETS/WPS Dialer App Now Available
For Apple, Android and BlackBerry**

([GETS/WPS NewsNotes](#)) Users have reported the GETS/WPS Dialer was very helpful during the 2018 hurricane season. The dialer app provided a simplified and quick way to make GETS and WPS calls while reducing user dialing errors.

The dialer app, titled "PTS Dialer", is available for free down-load from the Apple App Store, Google Play Store, and for BlackBerry. Go to: <https://gets-wps.csgov.com/apps/>

[*Note: The GETS/WPS site said in an August 13th post that "All WPS carriers now waive fees for most subscribers." It goes on to say that "Verizon Wireless waives fees for public sector (Federal, State, local, tribal, and territorial government) and for first responders with person-al BYOD enrolled in the Verizon First Responders Benefits Program. Verizon Wireless bills fees for private sector (industry and consumer)."*]

Learn more about [Wireless Priority Service \(WPS\)](#) and [Government Emergency Telephone Service \(GETS\)](#) for **wired** phones, and the associated costs of each. Hospitals, EMS, and many ESF-8 partners are likely to be eligible for GETS and WPS.

WPS and FirstNet

FirstNet and WPS are separate services that support the public safety community. *WPS is supported on the FirstNet network.* FirstNet provides priority and preemption on the AT&T 4G LTE network for FirstNet users. When both First-Net service and WPS are provisioned on the same phone, FirstNet subscribers can invoke WPS to receive the benefit of priority on voice calls that extend beyond the AT&T FirstNet network when calling users on participating WPS carriers.

AT&T provides WPS at no additional charge to subscribers who are either on an AT&T commercial plan or FirstNet rate plan. For FirstNet pricing and to sign up for the service, visit <http://www.firstnet.com>. Contact your local AT&T FirstNet specialist for more information. Existing FirstNet users must request WPS using the standard WPS subscription process. Go to www.dhs.gov/wps and click on link for Requesting GETS and WPS (<https://www.dhs.gov/cisa/requesting-gets-and-wps>). Please note that current AT&T WPS users that are migrating to FirstNet service can continue to maintain their WPS service, because the WPS feature will be automatically transferred.

Running Windows 7, 8 or 10? You need to patch these critical vulnerabilities now

(Tech Radar) Microsoft has issued patches for a pair of critical vulnerabilities which are 'wormable' and present in all recent versions of Windows, with the software giant advising that you should download these as soon as possible due to the risk involved here. The vulnerabilities in Remote Desktop Services, which allow for remote code execution – meaning the attacker can pretty much pull off anything, such as installing malware or plundering your data – are codenamed CVE-2019-1181 and CVE-2019-1182.
