Norton Children's Hospital proudly chose to feature all their volunteers as the Volunteer Spotlight for this edition.

Norton Children's Hospital, Kentucky's only free standing pediatric facility, is fortunate to have an average of 467 volunteers donating over 1,620 hours each month. With a robust Summer Teen Volunteer program, college students and retired individuals, the volunteer pool ranges in ages from 13 - 81. On most days you will find 24 or more volunteers throughout the hallways of the hospital.

The volunteers help or assist in more than 14 areas, including the gift shop, serving as patient/family ambassadors, delivering toys to patients or delivering hot coffee and snacks between meals. According to Brenda O'Bryan, Manager of Volunteer Services, they really will do anything that needs to be done and they do it with a smile while projecting comfort toward our patients and families. "Whether they are helping deliver gifts from Santa for a group visit or taking the coffee cart around for a second or third round because of the high patient census, the volunteers are always up for the task at hand" reports O'Bryan.

Many of the volunteers sign up for additional shifts during the holidays or during days of high census because they know extra hugs, playtime or just giving exhausted parents a break is so important. "Hospitals can be a very stressful, but often times you can see some of the stress melt away when a parent or caregiver is greeted by a volunteer," O'Bryan said.

#### **Baptist Health Lexington**



It was a busy year at Baptist Health Lexington! The hospital had 435 unique volunteers serve the facility during 2019. Adults accounted for 175 volunteers while the student volunteers included both college (81) and high school (179) students. These volunteers combined to contribute 41,583 hours of service.

During the Christmas luncheon, the group was entertained by the choir of a local school that has had several contestants on national TV music competitions. The highlight of the event was when outgoing Auxiliary President Candy Field presented hospital President Bill Sisson with a check to provide \$100,000 in continuing education for the hospital's clinical staff over the next several years. Of course, this was made possible by the amazing hard work of volunteers in the gift shop and Gift Shop Manager Amanda, who had consecutive record-setting years for sales!

In fact, the Auxiliary Board met after the Christmas luncheon and decided to extend their generous support of education to high school volunteers. There are two highly competitive programs at Baptist Health Lexington, the VolunTeen Fellowship and the Southside Practicum. Five students were accepted into each program and the Auxiliary Board decided to fund \$2,500 scholarships for each of these students in 2020!

# **Crafting Fun**

#### How to Make a Handkerchief Bonnet

Materials Needed: lace handkerchief, needle, white thread, 1/4in wide white ribbon, embellishments (Optional)

#### Directions

- 1. Iron the handkerchief flat
- 2. Fold one edge approximately one inch (this will be the back on the hankie). Depending the size of the hankie or the way you would like the bonnet to look, you may want to adjust this fold anywhere from 1 to 2 inches.
- 3. Fold the opposite edge toward the first fold approximately 3 inches. Again, this length of this fold may depend on the size of your hankie. Make sure to leave some space between the two rows of lace.
- 4. Press both folded edges with an iron.
- 5. Open the hankie and hand stitch running stitches along the first fold. Do not knot or finish this stitch off.
- 6. Refold the hankie along the pressed line.
- 7. Now with the first fold, pull on the thread to gather the hanky into a bonnet.
- 8. When the desired size is reached, secure the thread and finish the bonnet off by adding ribbon at the back of the bonnet.
- 9. Now with the second fold, take each corner and fold a small edge into the hankie (this will form a small triangle inside the bonnet)
- 10. Add a length of ribbon for tying onto each corner of the front of the bonnet. If desired, add small embellishments to add a decorative touch.

#### How to Make a Handkerchief Doll

Materials Needed: Handkerchief, rubber band, polyester fiberfill, Embellishments (optional)

- 1. Unfold the handkerchief, so you can see all four corners at once.
- 2. Create a loose knot in each of the top 2 corners of the handkerchief to form sleeves.
- 3. Holding both of those knots one in each hand create the head by using your thumbs to create a poofy space in the handkerchief between the arms.
- 4. Tuck some polyester fiberfill, tissue paper, or a small piece of leftover cloth into the head area so it will hold its shape.
- 5. Wrap a rubber band several times around the neck of the doll to hold the stuffing within the head.
- 6. Lightly tug on the arm knots to bring the edges of her "dress" out like a sweater would drape open over the stomach area.
- 7. Move the arm knots closer to the head in order to bring the folds of the dress closer to the center of the doll's body.
- 8. Tie a thin ribbon in a complementary color around the doll's neck to hide the rubber band. You can leave the ends of the ribbon long and flowing or cut them short closer to the doll's neck.

Optional steps:

- If you want to create the effect of a bonnet on the doll's head, then add a small piece of ribbon around the head. You could glue it or sew it on
- You could also add a piece of lace along the dress bottom.



#### Suggested Attachment

I am just a little hankie, as square as can be; but with a stitch or two, they've made a keepsake out of me. I'll be sent home from the hospital, and used on special days, and then I'll be carefully pressed and neatly packed away.
